The call to compassion

Stella Wiseman writes:

What are the two greatest commandments? Jesus put it simply in Mark 30-31: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength" and "You shall love your neighbour as yourself". Simple, but difficult.

Then there is a letter from John which reads: "Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God" (1 John 4:7). This seems to make it easier - if we love we know God. Phew! I love my family. I love my friends. So maybe I see a bit of God in that love. OK, I am not so keen on that man who upset me the other day, or the person who had a go at me in the car park, or the managers I worked for many years ago who froze me and others out, or those who hurt people I love, or...

Nor am I very keen on myself when I let people down or don't live up to my own expectations (even if these are unreasonable!).

This is something I have wrestled with over the past few years, and perhaps my imminent ordination as priest has made the wrestling more intense. I want to fulfil the calling to be a priest and to be a good priest, a loving priest, a wise one, someone who cares for people, someone who reflects a little of God.


As I have wrestled, I have kept coming across the word 'compassion' and the importance of self-compassion. I recommend a book by Paul Gilbert called *The Compassionate Mind* which looks at how we can develop compassion for others and ourselves and so cope better with what life throws at us, responding to ourselves and others with calmer kindness.

It's not easy to break the habits of a lifetime, but maybe it is just possible. Maybe breaking habits of a lifetime is the same as being born again, dying to the old self, rising with Christ, finding a new way of living that reflects more of God. Maybe that is a calling for us all.

But, as it says in the ordination service: 'you cannot bear the weight of this calling in your own strength, but only by the grace and power of God'. So every day let us put ourselves before God and ask for that grace to be compassionate.



THE BADSHOT LEADER July 2023



Badshot Lea Bloomers

Summer is finally here. The rain has eased, the sun is warming up and everything is growing like mad. Especially the weeds.

We now have seven young families using our raised beds and watching their food grow while learning that snails and pigeons also like their produce.

Farnham in Bloom had their formal launch of this year's RHS competition at Badshot Lea Garden Centre in April but the real work was already underway with the planting of 40,000 plug plants and the running of two days of Blooming Kids Workshops at Easter, thanks in a large part to the Badshot Lea Bloomers.

The Community Garden celebrated the King's Coronation by holding a Coronation Volunteer day on Monday 8th May. We started with a village wide litter pick and the planting of a tree in the Community Garden, children helped us plant 30 sunflowers along our front hedge. The weather was not brilliant but it did not stop us finishing the day with a picnic in the garden.

Opening our garden shop on site has made a big difference to our income this year but it did not stop us attending the Weybourne Well Being Fair again this year. This is becoming a major spring event and we are delighted to be part of it. We were selling everything from shrubs to hanging baskets to bedding plants and had a great day meeting so many local people.

We have been at the Badshot Lea Pond and the Badshot Park Orchard working with the Waverley Ranger to maintain our Green Flag status by promoting the development of wildflower areas. We have mowing access paths trimmed the edges and sowing wildflower seeds. It was therefore very disappointing to see Waverley change their policy and start mowing these areas again in late May.

Badshot Lea is probably unique in having a Victorian hop kiln as its village hall. It was built in 1886 for Walter Tice, of Runfold Farm, who the writer, George Sturt, regarded as Farnham's most successful hop grower. The Kiln was built with rolling screens on the upper drying floor and the latest hop presses on the floor below. One of the screens and a selection of artefacts are preserved in the Tice room. The builder was Thomas Diamond of Castle Street, Farnham and it cost Walter £1,173.

The drying process was a key stage in hop production, and before pyrometers came in, a skilled dryer was required, as the correct amount of moisture had to be left in the hops. Initially, charcoal fires were used to dry the hops, and small amounts of sulphur were added to kill any insects. I well remember the acrid smell, when walking past the Kiln. Later gas fires were introduced.

Sadly, Walter was only 54 when he died on 17TH December 1908, leaving his son Fred Tice to run the farm through the difficult years of the Great War, when many acres of hops were grubbed up in order to grow food. There was a sad incident at the Kiln in December 1915, when a private in the RASC, Richard Finlay, hanged himself at the Kiln. He was suffering from combat stress, after serving with the ambulances in France.

Some growers never planted hops again, but Fred Tice continued at Runfold. Out of season, the Kiln was used in connection with his other enterprise, sending vegetables to Convent Garden Market. When Fred died in 1940, his brother, Alan, took over at Runfold, and it was he who began to increase the acreage of his farm. By this time hop poles had been abandoned in favour of coir strings, which were supported by permanent posts and wires.

All this time the Kiln remained in regular use, and until the 1950's the hops were picked by hand by families from Badshot Lea and Aldershot. The last time I picked hops was in 1954, and the following year Alan Tice installed a hop picking machine, which was housed in the asbestos building next to the Kiln, The hand pickers were phased out, and students engaged instead, although some local women were still needed to pick out any unwanted leaves. The hops were then placed loosely into bags and sent by an elevator up to the drying floor in the Kiln.

When Alan Tice retired his son, Jim, took over the farm, which now extended over 398 acres. But by the 1970's farming at Runfold was coming under new pressures. Common Market regulations clashed with British hop growing methods, the farm was suffering from vandalism, and land was being sought by developers. Then valuable gravel deposits were found under much of the land. After the gravel had been extracted, the land was allowed to return to nature as Tice's Meadow Reserve.

Shortly after we moved to Badshot Park, my wife and I were shown over the Kiln in 1972 by the last dryer, Heinz Muller, who was one of several German ex-POW's, who stayed and married local girls. The following year the farm was sold at auction and the Kiln together with the hop picking machine building and 2.290 acres was sold as lot 15 to a developer, Mr Cook, It was the end of an era.

Development and the Local Environment

Two recent decisions at planning appeals have shown once again the importance of our Neighbourhood Plan.

With the Waverley Local Plan now over five years old and the Farnham Neighbourhood Plan (FNP) now over two years old the decision on these matters is now decided by what is known as the `planning balance'. This involves weighing up the benefit of the provision of more homes against the harm the loss of the fields will have on the local area. The two sites are either side of the railway off Lower Weybourne Lane and Green Lane and not included in the FNP. Therefore we regard them as unwanted speculative development.

Despite local planning policy deemed as out of date, the Inspectors felt very strongly that policies, particularly within the FNP, attracted considerable weight. They also acknowledge that the FNP is providing in excess of its housing requirement through planned development and giving permission here would seriously undermine its credibility. It would also be incompatible with the environmental objectives contained in the FNP.

Each appeal was heard by an independent government Inspector and both felt that development of each site would be harmful to the environment and character of the area and noted that it was the wish of the local community to retain these open areas.

These are very positive decisions for our community but cannot be seen as indicative of what will happen when other appeals come forward over the next few months. Every site is different and will have its own attributes to be considered within the planning balance.

However, on this occasion local planning policy, the environment and local opinion played their part in these decisions and we can only hope that they continue to do so.

The return of Messy Church!


