Where is God in the pain of tragedy?

When I heard the dreadful news of the knife attacks in Stockport on July 29th, for some reason it brought to mind the deaths of my parents and the way I reacted to them.

It was nothing like the shocking brutality of the deaths in Southport. Both parents had terminal cancer; nevertheless their parting was so hard to accept.

With my father I was in complete denial so, when he did die, I guess I went into a kind of shock. I could not understand how life could go on — why are people just continuing as if nothing had happened? Why hadn't the world ground to a halt?

A gentle word of reassurance soothed my pain: "it will be alright, just give it time". And given time the pain did ease, and I did learn to engage with the world again.

With my mother it was different. I knew her days were ending, but the last few days were an agony; I felt an abandonment, not necessarily of me, but of my mum – how could God let this happen? Why doesn't he step in and do something?

I disclaimed God. He was just an invention created to make us feel better

about the things thrown at us. I was really angry; 'it's all a lie I shouted'. The person who received my initial ranting was my brother — a self-acclaimed atheist! I wonder what he thought about my outburst; maybe I'll ask him one day.

However, something kept me connected to church. Then I once again heard a gentle word that gave me back my hope of a truth in the faith in Christ. This word came to me when I was in my car driving to work. I was on my own, concerned about aspects of my life and the voice came to me: 'It's going to be ok', and I am convinced I felt my mother's presence. That reassurance was

enough to help me back on track, to have a confidence in a loving everpresent God.

But what of those parents losing their children in this frenzied attack? How I can I possibly imagine their reactions to those deaths so sudden and unpredictable? What gentle words could they be exposed to which would make anything feel remotely more comfortable?

I thought of John 6:35: 'I am the bread of life'. That is what Jesus promised, that Jesus is the way to eternal life and is the hope the families of the children need. So, through our prayers, maybe a gentle word will touch their broken hearts, that one day, the chil-

dren and their loved ones will be reunited in the blissful love of God.

Of course there was another life lost that night, the life of a young man, barely out of childhood himself. I cannot imagine the torment he must have been carrying that would drive him to do such a thing. And his life is indeed now lost. If he is ever released back into society it's likely to be under a different name and with a different life story.

Does he also deserve our prayers? Yes, I would say he needs them just as the families that he has destroyed. And maybe, by the grace of God, he will also be cleansed by the blood of Christ and find some peace in this world and the world to come. Kris Lawrence

Vacancy update

For those of you keeping track of our recruitment activities, you will know that the closing date for second round of advertising for the post of Rector of Badshot Lea and Hale was in early August. I am disappointed to report that we had no applications, although I have to admit that I am not totally surprised as most parishes take a year to 18 months to fill a vacancy because of the shortage of available clergy.

We will embark on the third round of advertising soon with a view to interviewing in early January and having someone in post just after Easter 2025. Especially with this type of role, it is about finding the right person at the right time in their ministry and we continue to pray that God will send us the right person at the right time.

I am pleased to report that the team managing the parish during the vacancy has settled into a sound routine and are ready for a long vacancy should that be the case. That is not to say that we have not had our chal-

lenges, including Rev'd John Evans being unwell for so long. He is now on the road to recovery and leading our services again. We have also realised that Rev'd David Camp needs the support of an incumbent to complete the remaining two years of his training. While we will be sad that we will not see as much of him from September, we are fully supportive of his move to Frensham as the right decision to help him along his ministry journey.

The news that the tower at St John's is in a worse state than we thought adds another challenge to just doing the normal. See page 19 for details of the appeals to help raise funds for its repair.

My thanks to those across the parish who are pulling together to help us deliver business as usual to the best of our ability. If anyone feels that they can help contribute please contact either Stella or me.

A history of the Beetle (Scarecrow) Drive

A beetle drive is a simple social game where players compete to draw a complete beetle by rolling dice. Roll six to draw a body (which must be drawn first), five to add the head, three or four to add legs, two for antennae and one for a nose. This can vary of course and other drawings can take the place of the beetle, such as a snowman (we held a snowman drive earlier in the year) or a scarecrow, which is what we will be drawing on the evening of September 21 (see page 17).

The first player to complete their beetle yells 'Beetle!' (or 'Scarecrow!') and wins the round, earning points. The game typically includes multiple rounds, with players moving to different tables after each round, and the player with the most points at the end of the evening is crowed the winner.

The exact origins of beetle drives are unclear, but the game probably originated in the UK in the early 20th century, inspired by Victorian parlour games, often simple drawing games and required minimal materials, making them

accessible to everyone. The basic idea of drawing different parts of an object based on dice rolls probably evolved into the version of the beetle drive that we know today.

The game became particularly popular in the UK during the 1940s to 1960s, often as a fundraising activity in local communities, just like today!

As the years passed, the beetle drive spread beyond the UK, becoming popular in other English-speaking countries. The game has seen various adaptations, with different versions of the beetle and slight rule variations, but the core concept remains the same.

Fashion! Whether you're a dedicated follower or think it's a waste of time. you probably have a lot of clothes, right? Most of us have full wardrobes. According to the website businesswaste.co.uk the average British person spends £980.50 on new clothes every vear.

So, what happens to the clothes we no longer want?


The charity Clothes Aid estimates that 350,000 tonnes, that's around f140 million worth of used but still wearable clothing, goes to landfill in the UK every year. Ouch!

Of course we do send clothes to recycling centres, textile banks, clothes collections and to charity - on average 700,000 tonnes, or enough to fill 459 Olympic-size swimming pools - but a lot of this ends up abroad as we are the second biggest exporter of used textiles worldwide, and if it isn't resaleable there, it just gets dumped or burned.

It's time for a change in our clothes shopping habits. From now on why not donate your old, good quality clothes to our new clothes bank, and pick up new (to you) ones completely free of charge at our new clothes bank? It will be opening at St Mark's on Monday mornings 9-11.30am from September 9th.

Thank God for farmers!

Few of us work on farms these days, but it doesn't stop us celebrating harvest. We haven't had to do all the hard labour getting the crops in and this year let say a huge thank-you to the farmers who work extremely hard throughout the year, and particularly at harvest time. Farming is a tough profession and post-Brexit labour shortages have combined with climate change and economic challenges to mean that many are having to diversify if they are to stay viable. Without UK farmers we'd have to import far more food – more than half of what we eat is produced in the UK. So, thank you farmers and we thank God for you.



Foodbank

At the services we will be collecting food for Farnham Foodbank, which supports families and individuals in Farnham and the surrounding area and last year was able to help 2,787 people. The foodbank is particularly looking for tinned soup, instant mash, tinned rice pudding and custard, tinned tomatoes and toilet paper, so please put some in your basket next time you are shopping and bring them to your church for harvest.

The colour purple

As I write, the heather is in full bloom, and I hope it is still going by the time you read this. We are lucky to have so many local areas of heathland – Farnham Heath, Frensham Common, Hankley – to name but a few. There are two types of heather, both natives: bell heather (*Erica cinera*) which seems to flower earlier and is a brighter shade of purple/pink, and common heather or ling (*Calluna vulgaris*), which is a pale lilac. Walking across heathland is one of the joys of high summer – you can hear the hum of the bees and just smell the honey! Heather honey is very distinctive, quite thick and dark, and it smells just like the heathland.

But heather is not just for honey bees, it is valuable forage for other bees including the eponymous heath bumblebee and the green-eyed flower bee. The latter is quite easy to identify, even if you can't spot the green eyes of this small bee, as it has a high pitched buzz and hovering flight which is quite distinctive. This is a mining bee, which digs burrows in sandy soil, and although solitary in that it does not live in a colony, you can often see congregations of them in a sandy area with the tell-tale piles of sand which they have dug out! I have seen both species recently on nearby Puttenham Common with our new beekeeping group (see below!) together with the lovely pantaloon bee, another mining bee, its pantaloons bright with pollen as it enters its burrow, where it lays each egg individually together with a store of pollen and nectar.

Pollinator plant of the month – Rowan

The orange-red berries of the native rowan tree (*Sorbus aucu-paria*) are particularly good this year. Rowan is a great tree for wildlife, the small white flowers in May and June provide pollen and nectar for a range of insects, including flies, bees and bee-



tles, who in turn oblige by pollinating the flowers so they turn into the berries which are such a rich source of food for a variety of birds. There are many varieties which can be planted in gardens, some with good autumn colour.

September plants for pollinators

Dahlias and cosmos are still flowering, along with Japanese anemones and sedums. Sedums in particular are great for pollinators, with their flat, nectar-rich flowerheads. They are also drought resistant, with fleshy leaves, and love a sunny well-drained border. Easy to divide too! Ivy should also be starting to bloom now, the main forage plant of the ivy bee, and a valuable late forage source for other pollinators.

Stop press! Bee-PLUS Community beekeeping group

Have you ever fancied trying beekeeping? Are you on your own and want to try something different? Do you want to make a positive difference to the environment?

Hive Helpers is now running a community beekeeping group for adults, thanks to funding through the Community Foundation Surrey. Called Bee-PLUS – because it's beekeeping plus a whole lot more! – there will be lots of activities on offer as well as beekeeping, including planting for pollinators, how to ID bumblebees and solitary bees, pollinator walks and practical conservation of local habitats. Above all, Bee-PLUS will be a social group where people can enjoy be-



ing outdoors and making a difference to the environment, whilst improving their physical and mental wellbeing.

Bee-PLUS runs weekly on Tuesdays from 5-8pm at Farnham Community Farm. It is



free to attend and help with transport can be arranged. Please email us on office@hivehelpers.co.uk or phone us on 07895 547637 for more information.

In turn it can lead to low selfesteem and poor physical and mental health and can have an impact on early childhood development, learning, employability and social interaction.

The products you give will be distributed to community partners - a mix of organisations, charities and schools - who support those of us who have found ourselves in poverty.


