Remembrance and what it may mean

This month we will mark Remembrance Sunday, with solemn ceremonies at war memorials and services in all our churches.

We are remembering those who have died in the two World Wars and in other conflicts around the world since the beginning of the 20th century, and there are many millions to remember. According to the Imperial War Museum, a conservative estimate is that 187 million people have died as a result of war from 1900 to the present.

That is a sobering number. Any number is sobering, and on top of this we see present-day scenes of devastation on newsreels reporting, mostly from the Middle East, Ukraine and Russia, but at times from some of the other countries where there is war, such as Yemen, Syria, Myanmar, Sudan, Burkina Faso, Sudan... In Mexico the drug wars claim around 10,000 lives a year.

How do we respond, we who follow a faith centred around the one known as the Prince of Peace? What are we to make of Remembrance Sunday? And of the red poppy which so many of us wear? Is this a glorification of war or a sign of peace?

The Royal British Legion (RBL), which has sold the poppies since 1921, has always intended them as a symbol of remembrance of all those who have died in wars involving the UK and Remembrance Day services and ceremonies are doing the same.

Dying for a cause which you believe is right, and which the democratically elected government of a country believes is right, is a sacrifice which has been made by millions. Millions more have been injured in these wars and the RBL spends money it raises through poppy sales on support for the Armed Forces, helping injured and/or traumatised service men and women, providing financial support and advice where needed, and supporting service families and veterans in many ways.

So there is no glorification, but a recognition of pain and sacrifice and, in churches, prayer that war may cease. Yet over the past decade or so I have noticed a polarisation of views over Remembrance and poppies, with people vilified for not wearing them (or even receiving death threats in more public cases) and a slew of stories on social media about communities banning them. The RBL says it has never found any community banning them and the stories appear mostly to be an attempt at stirring up hatred against certain groups, in particular Islamic ones.

I have also felt increasingly unwilling to wear a red poppy because I feel the symbol, and the whole of the time of Remembrance, is being highjacked by people who do not aim for peace or even the democracy that many died to defend. No-one should feel forced to wear a poppy, no-one should be attacked for not wearing one or for wearing a white poppy, which is a symbol of peace, established in 1933 by women who had lost family in World War I and who felt that the symbol of the red poppy was moving away from the message of 'never again'.

Yet, I also feel exposed not wearing a red poppy, or if I choose to wear a white one, even if I wear a red one and a white one, because there is so much strong feeling in society about those who, apparently, do not support 'our heroes', or who don't do what proper English people should do.

So what is a Christian to do? Do what our conscience tells us. For many that will be to wear a red poppy, to attend a Remembrance service, watch the Cenotaph ceremony. For others it will be to wear a white poppy, or both a red and a white poppy, or none. But most of all I believe that we should pray for peace, and stand up against hatred wherever we find it, praying for our enemies and always seeking the spark of God in everyone we meet.

Contemplative prayer

Contemplative Prayer

Would you like to deepen your understanding of God, understand more what God might be calling you to, hear God inside you? If so, join me in an exploration of Contemplative Prayer.

I will be running a short course on contemplative prayer this Advent, on Tuesday afternoons at 2pm at St Mark's, beginning on December 3rd.

Also known as centering prayer, contemplative prayer is a way of bringing ourselves before God in stillness. It is similar to mindfulness practice in that you take a word of short phrase —Maranatha is a good one, or Jesus, or Divine Love – and repeat it slowly in your mind as you breathe in and out, returning to the word or phrase as your mind wanders (and it will) while you sit in silence. You do not sit and think about what has been or what will be, but just are there in the present moment, in the presence of God.

There will be a short introduction and reading at the beginning of the session and then we will spend time in contemplative prayer before a short reading at the end.

Planning Issues

Earlier in the year we received the good news that Neighbourhood Plans will now carry full weight for five years instead of just two. The good news now is that the new draft National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) has not changed this although some of the other proposed changes are definitely not good news.

The government has committed to build 370,000 new homes each year and hopes to achieve this with some radical changes to planning guidance. The changes include a mandatory uplift in housing numbers across the country with the Waverley target increasing to 1379 homes per annum. In recent years Waverley have greatly improved their housing delivery and managed around 770 new homes per annum. It seems highly unlikely that Waverley, along with many other boroughs, would be able to provide homes at this much higher level.

Clearly this could have severe consequences for Farnham. It is the largest town in the borough with (arguably) good road and rail links and would be expected to take a significant number of these new homes. It will be up to the Waverley Local Plan and the Farnham Neighbourhood Plan to find sites to accommodate all of this, otherwise the whole thing could be open to unplanned and uncontrolled speculative development.

The government have just conducted a consultation on the changes to the planning system and many local authorities are highlighting all the reasons why they will find it impossible to meet the new housing target. We at BLCA have completed the survey, and our partners at South Farnham Residents have done likewise. Hopefully many other residents associations have also taken part.

So, our Neighbourhood Plan is currently under review but very much dependent on the final guidance issued by the government. If nothing changes Waverley will then have to decide how to distribute this huge number of homes across the borough.

We do support the provision of new homes through planned development and hope that the Neighbourhood Plan will continue to give us the means to do that. We will do all we can to ensure the new Neighbourhood Plan is progressed and adopted at the earliest opportunity.

Ernest James Holdup, baker, bandsman and "Happy Hero".

Before the great War most villages had a band, and Badshot Lea was no exception, boasting one on several occasions. An early ensemble was a temperance band, associated with the Primitive Methodists, and the bandsmen wore bottle green uniforms. However, Monica Tice wrote how this band came to a sticky end in her history of the church in 1953.

The story goes that the musicians entered a dubious band competition in Aldershot, and won the prize which was a case of whisky. Despite protests from a few members, the contents were

consumed on the spot, and when the culprits staggered back to the Lea the instruments were locked securely in the Chapel and the band was wound up.

By 1914 another brass band was in being, when the Farnham Herald reported on their AGM held in the Crown Hop Kiln. The secretary was Mr Roe, the bandmaster was Mr Rickets, with

Mr C. King as his Deputy. The treasurer was a 19-year-old trombonist, Ernest James Holdup. The 1911 census shows Ernest was living at Runfold bakery where he worked as an assistant to the long-established Wilkinson family's bakery.

During 1914 the band had played in Aldershot and the surrounding villages as well as in Badshot Lea. Things were going well, with a comfortable bank balance. Then on 28th June a shot was fired in far off Sarajevo which triggered the Great War and Britain mobilised its forces on 4th August. Like so many young men in Britain Ernest and his mates knew what was expected of them and they rushed to join up.

On 26th September the Farnham Herald reported that at a meeting in the Mission Room, chaired by Reverent Durrant, it was said that 7 or 8 bandsmen had joined up, and the Badshot Lea Brass Band was suspended. Ernest Holdup had been among the first to enlist in the Queen's Royal (West Surrey) Regiment with headquarters at Stoughton near Guildford.

By September Ernest was in Milton Barracks, Gravesend, from where he and his pals wrote to the Farnham Herald, who published their rather naïve letter on 12th September.

"No doubt the readers of the Herald will be pleased to know how the recruits from Farnham are getting on in their new home. Although most of us have been sent to different barracks, there are still 18 young Farnham Men together in Milton Barracks.

We had a hearty send off from Farnham, and we are proud to think that we can each do a little to keep the Germans out of England, which so far has held its own. Our only hardships are sleeping on bare floors and having to rush for food, but we shall get over this difficulty in a few days, which is only due to the fact that owing to a large number of enlistments in a short time, the authorities have not had time to make accommodation". It was signed by 18 of "Farnham's Happiest Heroes" and Ernest Holdup was the 14th

signatory. Most of this group of recruits were fast tracked into regular battalions of the Queen's to replace casualties.

The last definite record I have of Lance Corporal Ernest Holdup is from 1917, when he was fighting in the bloody battle of Passchendaele. The war diary of the 10th Battalion, the Queens records his final days.

Sept 18th. After a night in tents, the 10th Queen's were issued with grenades, extra ammo and 2 days rations, and when darkness fell, they moved up to the front. Their objectives were a series of German trenches on Tower Hamlets Ridge, along the Menin Road.

Sept 20th. Following several days bombardment the battalion moved forward at 5-40 am after 50 yards 2 machine guns "did great havoc, noticeably among the officers.

Sept 21st The Queens were subject to heavy artillery fire for 5 hours and then they repulsed a strong German counter attack.

Sept 22nd artillery, sniper and machine gun fire fell on the Queen's all day.

That day Ernest Holdup was listed as killed and his body was never found. His name is carved on the Tyne Cot Memorial to the Missing at Zonnebeke, Belgium, as well as the Badshot Lea War Memorial and the memorial at Hook, where his parents lived.

Do you 'LOVE WHERE YOU LIVE?', well that was the question put by Squires to the neighbourhoods around their 17 garden centres. It appears that we do, as the Badshot Lea Community Garden won top prize of £1000 in vouchers to spend at the garden centre. This enabled us to run several events throughout the summer. The first was a tallest sunflower competition, for which we grow 100 sunflowers to give out to over 70 entrees from under 11 year olds. Prizes and certificates were presented at our garden party at the end of August.

Our second new activity this year was our pre-school gardening and arts school, running for six weeks in June and July, on a Friday morning. This proved so popular we are already working on making it bigger and better next year. The funding from Squires has also helped support all our regular events from 'Bloomin' Kids workshops, apple pressing day and pumpkin carving.

The garden has had a busy summer, open three mornings a week, attending the Church and Schools fetes in the spring, having visits from Beaver groups and a creative arts group spent a day with us in the sun painting and drawing the garden. It was a true delight. We even had a visit from the Mayor of Farnham presenting us with a cheque for £1100 as a grant to buy a new gazebo and other equipment including an apple crusher and litter picking equipment for the children. We also had our yearly visit from the S & SE in Bloom judges and I attended the awards ceremony at Wisley. I am delighted to tell you that we achieved the highest level of 'OUTSTANDING' scoring 93% judged on the three categories of Environment. Horticulture and Community.

Away from the garden we have spent time working with others to try and find a way forward to ensure the future maintenance of the orchard in Gosling Place (opposite the Hop Kiln) recently awarded

a preservation order thanks to our local councillor Chris Jackman's hard work. We now have a joint effort by our local councillors from Farnham, Waverley and Surrey to try and set up a working group with the developers and ourselves to ensure this great asset is accessible and available to all.

Making a difference

Pollinator Patch with Juliet from Hive Helpers

It can be dispiriting hearing all the bad news about biodiversity loss – 97 per cent of wildflower meadows lost, an insect apocalypse, and shocking declines in bird species. More and more houses being built destroying yet more habitats, one of the biggest causes of biodiversity loss. But just recently I've been heartened by some good news locally.

First, I was invited by the Tice's Meadow Bird Group to the world premiere of a wonderful short film called Our Meadow, made by local film-maker Josh Guyan. Many people in the area will know of the struggles to keep this important nature reserve from the hands of developers, and it was down to a small group of dedicated volunteers to refuse to give up fighting for it, with the happy result that six councils, led by Surrey County Council, agreed to buy the site. The film celebrated the wildlife, but, above all, the people who made it happen.

Then I saw a post on the Blacknest Fields Facebook page that an adult



brown hairstreak butterfly had been found! These butterflies are listed by Butterfly Conservation as a High Priority species, and the butterfly in question was found on blackthorn, which had been purposefully allowed to grow on the site for them – what a result for the team of volunteers who have worked so hard on nature recovery at the site

We can all make a difference, especially in our gardens. According to the RHS, our gardens make up an area twice the size of Somerset and can

make a positive difference to biodiversity loss. They suggest planting perennials (trees, shrubs, herbaceous plants), plant for pollinators, garden without pesticides, let lawns grow naturally and make a pond. The reward is to see wildlife of all shapes and sizes using your garden – and happiness is seeing a bee visit a flower you planted just for them!

Pollinator plant of the month – Salvia 'Amistad'

Avid readers of this column might remember that I have long coveted this tall bushy perennial with beautiful deep purple tubular flowers. I planted one in my border for the first time this year and it has done splendidly, although I was initially disappointed not to see more bees on it – they seemed to prefer the humble toadflax which self-seeds all over my garden! Now

that is over, they have finally turned their attention to 'Amistad' which will continue flowering until the first frosts. I will take cuttings as insurance but I hope it will make it through the winter.

Other November plants for pollinators

Winter-flowering honeysuckle (Lonicera fragrantissima) is a a good source of nectar for late-flying bees, including the common carder bumblebee (Bombus pascuorum) which can be active into November. I have also seen these tough little bees with their gingery thoraxes on my hardy fuchsias and geraniums. At the time of writing, I have just divided my Geranium psilostemon, a terrific plant with its blackcentred magenta flowers but which had grown a little too vigorously for its position! Most hardy geraniums are easy to grow and all are good for pollinators - a small unnamed variety has been quietly flowering again recently and getting a lot of attentions from the hees!


