



TRAUMA: MORE RELEVANT TO EVERY DAY LIFE THAN WE REALISE

- Do you notice yourself reacting to seemingly small things in ways that seem out of proportion? Or perhaps you notice this in others around you? But where do these (over) reactions come from?
- Do you find yourself struggling with certain topics of conversation? Feeling like you'd like to escape or noticing you can't concentrate or keep zoning out? What goes on inside us that makes staying present hard?
- Do you ever get halfway through a sentence and your mind goes blank? Or you

It is said that a crisis doesn't make or break, it just reveals! The Cricketers is safe.

Many of you will have noticed that the lease for the Cricketers has been on the market, and the pub was threatened with closure, as has happened to so many village pubs. It is therefore good news that it has been taken over by J P Stubbins's chain of 17 Star Pubs. A new manager, Nikky Daws, is now in charge.

The Cricketers was one of the first buildings in Badshot Lea, being one of a ring of new pubs designed to cater for troops, who moved into the new camp at Aldershot 1854. The village marked the limits soldiers could go from camp without a pass. In the 1861 census the landlord was William Arnold who also worked as a carpenter. He advertised rooms for travellers.

A later landlord, "Cocker" Langridge, ran the pub during the Great War and he operated a coal delivery business from the yard. Cocker could be a difficult man at times and he fell out with



"Admiral Gibbs" over a debt. Gibbs, who became a Special Constable in the war got his own back by twice charging Langridge for allowing lights to show during the blackout. (Imposed because of Zeplin raids).

The photo shows the Pub in about 1910, when it was owned by the Guildford brewers, Lascelles Ticker. The man looking out of the window is Ernie Langridge, the landlord's son.

Nikky plans to run a traditional village pub, with basket meals from 12pm to 6pm on Monday to Saturday, and pre-booked Sunday Roasts. A meat raffle is held at 6pm on Friday. There is good coverage of sport on Sky and TNT, as well as a pool table and Juke Box.

Dockers or Baggies? - Football in Badshot Lea.

People in Badshot Lea are often puzzled when they read that Badshot Lea Football Club's First Eleven play their home matches at Wreccelsham, and wonder why. Well, it really is a success story, and the Club which was formed in the Lea has progressed steadily up the divisions. Promotion often means that grounds must conform to the higher standards of that division. However, Badshot Lea Junior and Colt teams still play on village and Weybourne recreation grounds.

Kickabout football must have taken place early on, although the only pubic space for games was the Green. This had been allocated for recreation when the enclosure map was drawn up in 1857. The present recreation ground was bought in 1929 and a Recreation Ground Committee was established which continues today. Prior to that, football and cricket matches were played on the fields of friendly land owners. Cricket was sometimes played on what is now Badshot Park. A gate in the old wall allowed access to the Crown. Both Badshot Lea School and the Evening Class boys were playing friendly matches by 1904, as were the nucleus of young men who met at the Mission Room at the beginning of the 1904 season to officially form Badshot Lea Football Club. Mr Billows was elected Captain, Chris Patrick became Secretary and Mr Hinwood Treasurer. The Reverand Tristram served as President.

Village morale was high in 1904, particularly when Badshot Lea won the Aldershot Hospital Carnival cup with their float. This was in the shape of a gun boat on a waggon towed by Humphry Gardener's team of horses. The story goes that the "Saucy Kipper" was built at the Badshot Lea Docks, (a pond where the garage now stands). For the next 50 years the villagers and Badshot Lea Football team were known as the Dockers. During their first season they fielded 2 teams. The first eleven won their first 3 matches and by April 1905 the reserves had won 8, drawn 3 and lost only 2.

The club soon joined the local leagues and were well established when war broke out in August 1914. It was then said it was "no time for games", and the new season was suspended. The captain at the time, Chris Patrick, was one player who never returned, having drowned in the river, while serving in Baghdad.

Friendly matches were resumed towards the end of the Great War, encouraged by the Revd. Durrant, and league football resumed in 1919. In those days most men played for their own villages and they were keenly followed. In the Runwick Cup final in 1924 a crowd of 1300 saw the Dockers beaten 1-0 to arch rivals Hale.

Between the wars Badshot Lea Football Club had begun their rise and in the golden season, of 1936/37 they won the Surrey Intermediate League, Farnham League Division 1, Surrey Junior Charity Cup and the Runwick Charity Cup.

In recent years the club have steadily risen, through the leagues and were playing in the Isthmian South-Central League in the 2024/25 season. Although sadly, they now call themselves "The Baggies" Just why is uncertain, but in the 1970's the school children referred to the village as Baggy Lea.

1st Weybourne Brownies

Brownies are girls aged 7 – 10 years, who work on the Girlguiding programme of activities which is



spread across six themes — Be Well, Have Adventures, Know Myself, Take Action, Skills for my Future and Express Myself. As one of our current volunteers said "I love volunteering with Girlguiding it's great fun, very rewarding and I've made life long friends. Running weekly meetings is not as hard as I'd thought it would be as Girlguiding have developed great sets of programme activity cards, it's all about learning whilst having lots of fun".

Please sign up to volunteer and give back to your local community, if your daughter is on a local Brownie waiting list it's a sure-fire way to get her to the top of the list by volunteering regularly yourself.

Pollinator Patch with Juliet from Hive Helpers



In praise of tussocks

There is a small wood near where I live, familiar to residents as Ten Acre Wood. It is small perfectly formed, with a valuable mix of habitats which has so far avoided development, although it has no specific protection that I know of. In autumn, it boasts a range of fungi including impressive of crop chanterelles. And there is a small clearing in the middle which at this time of year is buzzing with bumblebees, reminiscent of Yeats' 'bee-loud glade' in his wonderful poem The Lake Isle of Innisfree. There are large buff-tailed and common carder bumblebees scouting around in the long, tussocky grass, perfect for nesting bees. Grass which is long and beneficial for uneven is SO biodiversity, which leads me nicely to...

No Mow May

This is Plantlife's annual campaign which asks all gardeners, councils and landowners not to mow until the end of May, in order to boost the flowers and nectar available to pollinating insects. I have been pleased to see so many dandelions adorning our roadside verges, such a good source of early nectar, and I spotted a blue heart Rowledge to indicate that the area had been deliberately left wild and was not laziness on the part of the owners! Mossy and bare lawns are good too, although I haven't convinced my husband on that score!

Bee of the month – Common carder bee

Chances are that if you see a gingery, fluffy bumblebee, it will be a common carder (*Bombus pascuorum*). They are often found in gardens and woods and like all

bumble bees, it is a social insect making small nests in cavities, old bird's nests and mossy lawns. The name comes from the fact that they tease moss and dried grass with the bristles on their legs, brushing and shaping the material into a nest to keep the offspring warm and dry. They are long-tongued bees so like tubular flowers such as heather, clover, lavender.

Pollinator plant of the month – white dead nettle

White dead-nettle (Lamium album), as its name implies, does not sting, and can be commonly found on disturbed ground such as roadside verges, waste ground or grassy banks. The white hooded flowers attract lots of species of longtongued insects, including our

friend the common carder. It is also the food plant of several moth caterpillars, including the unmistakeable angle shades moth (Phlogophora meticulosa), which at rest looks like a withered autumn leaf. I always leave patches of nettles in the wild area at the bottom of my garden, but for some reason I don't have the white dead nettle, only the stinging variety (Urtica dioica) which is the food plant of several butterfly caterpillars, and a garden variety of yellow archangel (Lamium galeobdolon) which I discovered has the nickname of 'aluminium archangel' because of the silver streaks in its leaves. It is very invasive and I keep it under tight control, tolerating it only for the pollinator-friendly flowers.
