The rector arrives

There's a new rector in town. After 16 months with no-one in post, the parish has welcomed Rev'd Alexa (Lexi) Russell as its new rector. Rev'd Lexi was installed as Rector at a service at St George's Church on Monday, June 2nd, attended by parish members, visiting clergy, councillors and other community representatives.

Rt Rev'd Paul Davies (Bishop of

Dorking) installed Lexi as Rector, while other parts of the ceremony were conducted by Rev'd Robert Jenkins, Assistant Archdeacon of Surrey, and Rev'd Tara Hellings, Assistant Area Dean.

Lexi was Assistant Curate in the Wythenshawe Team in Manchester Diocese. She is in a civil partnership with Johanna, a doctor, and they have a nine-month-old son Leo.

Lexi said: "What a welcome we have had. I am incredibly grateful to all those who took the time to welcome us into the parish. The lead up to this moment has been immense not just for the parish but also for me, and I'm incredibly excited to see what God has planned for us all."

The installation service had its origins far back in the history of the Church of England and involved giving Lexi the 'cure of souls' – the spiritual responsibility for the parish – and the 'temporalities' of the parish, that is, the physical buildings and their contents. Lexi was also led round the church in a sym-

bolic series of acts which included having her hand placed on the door and receiving the keys, then tolling a bell; being seated in a chair (the 'stall of the priest'); pouring water into the font; receiving a large Bible; and placing bread and wine on the altar.



You may have visited Jane Austen's home in Chawton, but did you know that her family also had a Farnham connection? Jane's brother, Henry, be-



Pamela is licensed as a Lay Associate Minister

Pamela Marsham (pictured) churchwarden at St John's, will be licensed as a Lay Associate Minister at Guildford Cathedral on Saturday, July 5th, at 10.30am.

As a Lay Associate Minister, Pamela will continue to work alongside Lexi and the rest of the ministry team. Her course has focused on preaching, teaching and discipleship and she has also done the diocese's Worship Leaders Course.

"That for me is the most important as my focus is on leading worship. and Lexi is keen for me to continue to do that," says Pamela. "I have been lucky really, in that I have been able to gain experience in this while training."

During the course, Pamela particularly valued meeting others who were on the same path as she was. She adds: "We were all on a journey and it was exciting as we didn't really know what it would actually lead us to do. I think there are some in the group who will continue the journey and probably go on to train to either be LLMs or even become ordained. Those roles are definitely not what I will do as obviously age is against me but I can lead worship and that is a great privilege. I hope,



too, that I am showing that age is not a barrier to serving God."

"I am also reading more theology and am constantly learning more about what the Scriptures teach us."

Tickets to the licensing have been allocated but if you would still like to attend you can do so and can have unreserved seating which will be towards the back of the cathedral.

Village Hall

The Kiln in St George's Road is still a vibrant part of the community and has survived the double whammy of covid and the energy crisis. We have been very fortunate that we have not incurred any major expense on maintenance over recent years. This is always a potential problem for a building that is now 139 years old.

We continue to increase the use of the building with a new model car club that meets twice a month, occasional events by Surrey Wildlife Trust and craft fairs by Swancraft Designs. All the regular activities and contact details can be found on the BLCA website.

Parking

A number of residents have complained recently of the increasing problem of people parking on double yellow lines. This is particularly bad along sections of Badshot Lea Road by the entrance to the Preymead industrial estate. Please park sensibly and safely and be mindful of other road users.

New Bus Timetable

At last, a bus timetable review that has resulted in a more frequent service. We have been agitating for a better bus service for Badshot Lea for a number of years now, particularly as the village has grown considerably recently. The answer was always the same: the number 16 is subsidised by SCC and there is no funding available to improve the service.

So, against expectations, the new timetable introduced on 8th June provides two early buses and then an hourly service to Farnham from 09.35 until 13.35, with a less frequent service mid-afternoon, and then hourly from 16.45 to 18.45. The last bus back to Badshot Lea from Farnham is now an hour later at 19.45 from The Borough.

The service to Aldershot follows a similar pattern, two early buses and then hourly from 09.45, but please check with Stagecoach for full details of the new timetable.

Planning Issues

The Farnham Neighbourhood Plan is now out of date, along with the Waverley Local Plan. The policies contained in both documents still apply but will carry less weight, particularly as the Waverley Five-Year Housing Land Supply figure is now down to less than two years because of the massive increase in the government's housing target.

There are planning reforms proposed by the government, including reducing the opportunity for local planning committees to comment on minor applications, ie. up to 10 homes

or sites up to 0.5 hectares. These can be some of the most contentious and will be decided by Waverley planning officers.

The details of Local Government Re-organisation for Surrey are still undecided but need to be agreed by September. The huge problem of debt associated with some of the boroughs which Waverley will be tied to under the new authority still hangs over the whole process. It runs into billions of pounds and the government is showing no signs of any willingness to write them off

Morris Dancing at The Crown

The Crown Pub in Badshot Lea has traditionally welcomed Morris sides. These dancers, with their musicians, keep this long-established English custom of folk dancing alive. During the winter the sides practise, then, generally from May 1st onwards, they can be seen dancing and entertaining at various locations outside at pubs, fetes, festivals and other special events.

There are varying forms of Morris dancing, each originating in different regions of the

country. Those who were fortunate to see this season's dancing at The Crown were able to witness these various dancing traditions. This year has been very special as there have been three evenings of colourful, lively dancing outside the pub, demonstrating these traditions and contributing to an enjoyable evening for those watching.

On Tuesday, 20th May, Fleur-De-Lys Morris, along with Fleet Ladies Morris, assembled at 8pm and danced for an hour or so to the pleasure of the spectators. This was followed, on Friday, 30th May, by an evening of great performance by three sides, who all danced different styles. Jack Straws Morris,

our local side, who practise in Upper Hale, chiefly dance from the Morris tradition that was original found in the villages of the Cotswolds. They were joined by Alton Morris, who dance Border-style wearing rag jackets, they were accompanied by a large group of musicians. The third side that evening was Hook Eagles, who also wear colourful rag jackets, with hats decorated with feathers. It was a great evening.

They dance in the energetic North-West style which involves traditional processional dances which originate from the mill towns of West Yorkshire.

Thanks are due to Jayne Cole, landlady of the pub, for her hospitality, and all the dancers for their fine entertainment which is keeping our heritage and folk traditions alive.

Cometh the hour, cometh the man

As the parish welcomes a new rector, it is interesting to see the tasks set for previous incumbents. In 1899, Badshot Lea was part of Tongham Parish, having previously been joined to Hale. The Rev'd Topham was appointed as the first curate, with the ambition to build a new

church to replace the former National School in St George's Road. This had become available in 1895 as a Church Mission Room when the Council School opened.

Soon after St George's Church was consecrated on 24th October, 1903, Rev'd Topham was succeeded by Rev'd Tristram, who initiated the first parish magazine in October 1904.

However, Rev'd Durrant, previously from St Paul's, Brentford, who succeeded Rev'd Tristram in 1913, was dealt arguably the most difficult hand of all Bad-

shot Lea's priests. At that time, there was an urgent need of a new vicarage, and at first Durrant and his family lived in the rambling medieval Badshot House (now demolished, on the site of Beechtree Drive). By summer 1914 things were going well and the church held an ambitious two-day 'Dutch Village' fete to raise money for the project. It was attended by Princess Alice.

Then, on 4th August, war was declared with Rev'd Durrant in the firing line. A few days before, he had taken the Mothers' Union on a trip to Portsmouth, a month later he was chairing a committee on war relief, a meeting on recruiting and another at which the village brass band was dissolved. Most of the younger members had enlisted.

In spite of this, work started on the new parsonage at the end of September, supported by villagers 'buying a brick' for the project. The Durrant family were able to move in at the end of March 1915.

When recruitment was flagging at the end of the year, Lord Derby introduced a 'voluntary' scheme to get men to sign up to be called in groups, when required. Durrant, as a member of the Farnham Committee, personally canvassed 100 Badshot Lea men, with some success, but inevitably conscription came in on 27th January, 1916.

Meanwhile, money was still owing on the parsonage project and Revd Durrant was heavily involved in a 'Fancy Fair' in Manor Park, which, despite heavy rain, raised £154 out of £400 outstanding.

All the time Durrant carried out his routine parish duties. He always seemed to catch flu, and in January 1917 he was unable to present school prizes and, as so often happened, his wife stood in. In February he was dealing with applications for allot-

ments, and in March he dedicated the memorial to William Garrett, who drowned when HMS Hampshire was sunk. Also, in March he started voluntary war service, teaching part-time at the Grammar School, where he took charge of Form V boys, growing vegetables for local hospitals. On 25th June, 1917 another fete in Manor Park finally cleared the debt on the parsonage account, with £63 to spare! The optimistic clergyman was now talking about a new church hall and parish status.

As food shortages increased, caused by German submarines sinking supply ships, rationing came into force in September 1917. The Parsonage became the collection point for ration cards. It was vital nobody was forgotten. It is not surprising that the overworked clergyman was off sick for some time early in 1919 with a chill following over-strain and flu.

In January 1921, the Durrant family left Badshot Lea, to be succeeded by Rev'd Hugh Metcalf. For some reason it happened with little time for goodbyes, probably to sort out a problem at Revd Durrant's new parish at St Cuthbert's, Copnor, Portsmouth.

Pollinator Patch with Juliet from Hive Helpers

Bee Safari!

Last month I wrote about the Farnham Bee Trail, and now we have done our first Bee Safari as part of the Farnham Walking Festival.

A group of nine adults and five children walked (almost) the whole trail, starting at Gostrey Meadow and ending at the Farnham Maltings, led by Hive Helpers directors Erica and Juliet.

The group nearly didn't make it past the first hotspot in Gostrey Meadow, such were the number of bees we saw, including early bumblebees, mason bees and cuckoo bees! Other highlights were tree bumblebees in Farnham Park, green-eyed flower bees in the Residents' Border near Waitrose, and white-tailed bumblebees in the Bishop's Meadow. The extent and variety of bees and other pollinators in the town was simply astonishing.

During the course of the walk, Erica caught several different species



released afterwards). The children on the walk were keen to run ahead and find the next post to do their rubbing!

parts of our town which attract so many of our wild pollinators. Erica led another Bee Safari on 26th June, and in the summer holidays there will be three more Bee Safaris especially for children and their families, thanks to funding from Farnham Town Council. Bee of the month – cuckoo bees

Six of the UK's 24 bumblebees are cuckoo bees, so named because, just like the bird, they have a parasitic lifestyle.

The Bumblebee Conservation Trust website tells us that they are not a major threat to our social bumblebees and are important pollinators in their own right. A female cuckoo bee will go into the nest of a social bumblebee, kill the queen, and take it over for herself. A cuckoo bee does not produce any workers, just new females and males. They also don't collect pollen because the original queen's workers collect it for them!

We saw two species of cuckoo bee on our bee safari, the forest cuckoo (Bombus sylvestris) which is widespread, and the southern cuckoo (Bombus vestalis) which is common in the south. Although cuckoo bees don't

forage for nectar and pollen to provision their nests, they do visit flowers for their own sustenance.

Pollinator plant of the month – bramble

Not many of us would welcome bramble (*Rubus fruticosus*) into our gardens, but how many of us love to gather blackberries in hedgerows for bramble jelly, summer pudding or as an essential ingredient in pies and crumbles? We wouldn't have this free bounty were it not for the great job done by our pollinators. Moreover, bramble is important habitat for many animals, giving protection for nesting birds and small mammals, as well as fruit for birds like song thrushes and yellowhammers, and providing nectar for bees and butterflies.
